

Virginia House of Delegates Essay Contest 2008-2009 School Year

Statewide Essay Contest for All High School Juniors

The Virginia House of Delegates is pleased to announce its sixth annual statewide essay contest open to high school juniors. The goal is to provide students with an opportunity to conduct research and share their opinions on a topic that is related to Virginia's rich heritage.

Essay Topic

Students will write on the following topic:

On July 21, 2008, the Capitol Square Civil Rights Memorial at the Virginia State Capitol was dedicated in honor of the 1951 Robert R. Moton High School Protest, led by 16-yearold Barbara Johns. This protest led to the case of *Brown V. Board of Education of Topeka, Kansas,* and the resulting Supreme Court decision in 1954 struck down the "separate but equal" racial doctrine that governed school policy. It was a victory for all those involved in the struggle for full civil rights. However, this decision was only the beginning of a long struggle against "massive resistance" and toward racial integration that would eventually bring dramatic and positive societal change to Virginia and to the rest of the country.

What civil rights challenges do local and global communities continue to face, and how can today's youth be involved in the advancement of modern day civil rights movements?

Essay Rules

- 1. The essay must reflect the student's own research, writing, and original thinking.
- 2. Each student must complete and attach the Entry Form with their essay, which will serve as the title page.
- 3. Essays must be typed in Times New Roman, 12 point font, with a minimum of three (3) double-spaced, single-sided, numbered pages with one-inch margins. A title page and bibliography are required but are not included in the three page minimum. Graphics are not permitted.
- 4. The essay title, but NOT the student's name, MUST appear on the top of the first page of the essay.
- 5. Students must source at least four (4) references with the minimum of two (2) being published book sources to allow for verification of sources if necessary. References from encyclopedias or internet sites will be accepted, but are not considered as part of the two published book sources. If there are no book sources the essay will be disqualified.
- 6. The essay and bibliography must be documented in accordance with the Modern Language Association publication, MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers or Kate L. Turabian's publication, A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses, and Dissertations. Students may also use NoodleBib Express http://www.noodletools.com/login.php to compose source citations.
- 7. Entries must be received by December 1, 2008.
- Essays which meet the above rules will be accepted and judged equally on the following criteria:

 a) Clarity of thought
 b) Organization and proven topic
 c) Historical accuracy
 d) Grammar and spelling
 e) Documentation

Prize Details

One winner will be selected and will be invited to spend one day at the Virginia State Capitol during the 2009 Session with his/her representative in the Virginia House of Delegates. The winner will also be presented with a \$500 United States Savings Bond and a framed certificate on the floor of the Virginia House of Delegates.

Travel arrangements and accommodations for the winning student and their parent(s) or guardian(s) will be made and provided by the House of Delegates Clerk's Office.
